(1.A) Caught Being Kind

- Intro: Recognizing and Rewarding students for committing acts of kindness around the school
- Where Hallway/Classroom
- Resources: Caught being Kind Stickers, Bulletin Board, Push pins, Markers
- Instructions: When a student is found committing an act of kindness by a teacher or student, their name will be placed on a bulletin board and be given a sticker/reward for doing so



(1.B) Kindness Poster Program

- **Intro:** Schools receive monthly kindness posters to promote an environment of kindness
- Where: Classroom/Cafeteria/Hallway
- **Resources:** JP Poster, tape
- Instructions: Schools that commit to kindness throughout the year can sign up to be a part of the Kindness Poster Program from JonnyPops. Each month a school sends in pictures showing students learning kindness will receive a poster for that month.



























- Intro: Students create secret kindness envelopes for themselves and put one kindness assignment in each.
- Where: Classroom → Schoolwide
- Resources: Envelopes, markers
- Instructions: Students are tasked with committing acts of kindness around the school, chosen by them. This allows the teacher to begin organic discussions about kindness while the classroom works to create a positive impact on the school community.
- Examples of missions: sit by someone who is alone at lunch, help someone carry a heavy load, donate used clothing to the school nurse or social worker for students who may need them, write a thank-you note to the school janitor, etc.

(1.D) Random Acts of Kindness Calendar

- Intro: Schools receive monthly calendar with random acts of kindness for each day.
- Where: Classroom/Cafeteria/Hallway
- Resources: RAK calendar, Stickers/markers/tape, Completion reward
- **Instructions:** A school will receive this calendar and use it to get students to participate in random acts of kindness.
- **Example**: Students who complete the day's activity put a sticker with their name on it, and receive a reward

(1.E) Kind Designs

- Intro: Students will create their own kindness posters to create their own environment of Kindness!
- Where: Cafeteria/Hallway/Classroom
- Resources: Poster Boards, Markers, Crayons, Tape, Scissors, Misc.
 Arts and Crafts supplies
- Instructions: Divide students into small groups. Give each group a piece of poster board along with markers and other art supplies to design a kindness-themed poster. Have them brainstorm a list of kindness slogans or quotes about kindness.
- Examples: "Kindness Changes Lives.", "Kindness is Cool". They can then choose their favorite slogan or quote and design their poster around it. They can then hang their posters in the classroom, library, cafeteria, etc.



(1.F) Kindness Journals

- Intro: Students will create their own kindness journals to keep the conversation going inside and outside the classroom.
- Where: Cafeteria/Hallway/Classroom/Homework
- Resources: Journals, pencils
- Instructions: Students will be tasked after their school day, completing a kindness lesson, or an act of kindness themselves to reflect on their experience. They will be asked to write down answers to questions such as:
- Journal Question Examples: Describe what happened. What do you think about kindness in this case? What did you think and feel about what happened? What was your mood like before you completed the assignment? What was your mood like after you completed the assignment?



- Intro: Students will create their own acts of kindness and commit to them.
- Where: Cafeteria/Hallway/Classroom/Homework
- Resources: Popsicle Stick Kindness Template, pencil
- Instructions: Students will be tasked in the classroom, at lunch, or after school to fill out the template to complete an act of kindness. They will then hand in the paper slip to the teacher who will ask them after a designated period of time if they had completed the act of kindness. May be rewarded.

(1.H) Kindness Week

- Intro: Surrounding World Kindness Day, the entire week will be dedicated to learning about and acting on kindness
- Where/When: Schoolwide, Kindness Week
- Resources: (See associated activities for materials needed)
- Instructions: The classroom will follow an outline of lessons, activities, and missions to bring kindness into the school community for World Kindness Day!

Subject: Kindness

Standards Addressed: Kindness in the classroom and community (Language Arts, Social Studies)

- Language: Students adjust their use of spoken, written, and visual language (e.g, conventions, style, vocabulary) to communicate effectively with a variety of audiences and for different purposes
- Social Studies: the study of individual development and identity will help students describe factors important to the development of personal identity.

Objectives:

- Create a working understanding of what Kindness really is and understand tangible benefits of kindness.
- Promote students to make connections with what they have learned, and to apply it to their school and personal lives.
- Learn the importance of understanding how others are feeling and thinking to be compassionate.
- Empower students to improve school culture by implementing and spreading kindness.

(2.B) Lesson #1: Defining the Purpose of Kindness

LESSON PART 1: Defining the Purpose of Kindness

Materials Needed: Chalk board

Overview: The students will create a common definition of kindness and define importance.

Discussion: The class will begin with group discussion defining Kindness, and the various elements that go into being a kind person. This can include definitions, related virtues and quotes.

- Definition: Kindness is the quality of being warmhearted, considerate, human and sympathetic
- Kindness, backed by research, brings about real health benefits, reduces depression and bullying.
- Related words: Generosity, Benevolence, Consideration, Favor, Forgiveness, Helpfulness, Thoughtfulness, Compassion, Charity, Loving

Activity: As a class or in small groups class writes and agrees upon common definition of Kindness and behaviors associated with kindness.

- What does kindness look like? Refuse to ridicule others, show concern for others, treat everyone fairly, practice acts that make others happy
- This will serve as a flagship for the class to aspire to and the teacher to reference throughout the week

(2.B) Lesson #2: Examples of Kindness

LESSON PART 2: Examples of Kindness

Materials needed: See activity appendix for needs.

Overview: The students will engage in discussions, stories and subject area integration to promote idea generation of their own to promote a better school environment.

- Story: Teacher to share a story of kindness with the classroom
 - Resource: Story of cookies and kindness (appendix A)
- Activity to drive discussion on impact of kindness
 - Ripples activity (appendix B)
- Discussion
 - O When we do a kind act does it stop with just us?
 - O What do you feel when being kind to yourself and others?
 - O What stops us from being kind?
 - O How do you know when someone needs an act of kindness?
 - Ask questions such as: How can I help? Do you want to join? Are you okay?

Appendix A: Cookies and Kindness

– Author unknown –A young lady was waiting in the airport's departure area pending her flight home. After realizing there was a delay, she bought a small bag of chocolate chip cookies to enjoy while she waited.

She made her way to the VIP lounge to sit and relax. She sat down in an armchair to enjoy her cookies and read her book. Beside her sat a pleasant, young man reading his book. The bag of cookies between them. Neither spoke. The young lady took her first cookie. Then, much to her surprise, the young man also took a cookie.

He said nothing. She said nothing but was clearly bothered. For each cookie she took, he did the same. Again, no words or looks were exchanged, but her anger grew. This continued until there was only one cookie left.

Then the man took the last cookie and divided in half – leaving her half in the bag.

APPENDIX B: Ripples Activity

Materials needed: a pan with water, 3 items to drop in the water - 1 lg, 1 med, 1 small

- Hold the large item up and ask the class to think of a BIG act of kindness. Drop it in the water and show how big
 acts of kindness create a ripple effect.
- Hold up the medium item and ask the class to think of a little smaller act of kindness. Drop it in the water and show how big acts of kindness create a ripple effect.
- Hold up the small item and ask the class to think of a small act of kindness. Drop it in the water and show how big
 acts of kindness create a ripple effect.

Discuss how acts of kindness no matter how big or small create ripples of kindness that can change the world.



(2.C) Lesson #3: Kindness in Action

LESSON PART 3: KINDNESS IN ACTION

Materials needed: Kindness Pledge (appendix C)

Overview: The students will create ways and pledge to create more kindness in the world.

Activity

- Students sign kindness pledge.
- Ideas for class activities in kindness
 - Elementary: Create Popsicle stick picture frames for retirement homes, write letters of appreciation to school staff.
 - Secondary and High School: Create secret kindness envelopes for the number of students in the classroom and put one kindness assignment in each.
 - Examples of missions: sit by someone who is alone at lunch, help someone carry a heavy load, donate used clothing to the school nurse or social worker for students who may need them, etc.
- Ways to keep the discussion going
 - Students can create a journal in response to their kindness mission.
 - Journal Questions: Describe what happened. What did you think and feel about what happened? What was your mood like before you completed the assignment? What was your mood like after you completed the assignment?
 - Celebrate the kindness spread through leveraging "Get Caught Being Kind" reward package (appendix D)
